Welcome to United Lutheran Church! If you're new to worship, parts **for everyone to say together are in bold**, parts for worship leaders are in regular print. A brief description about themes of our worship today:

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world.

Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, who writes the law on our hearts, who draws all people together through Jesus.

GREAT THANKSGIVING (standing)




It is indeed right, our duty and our joy that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God,

Through him all glory and honor is yours,


Almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit,

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.




INVITATION TO COMMUNION

COMMUNION

All are welcome to commune. Worshipers seated on the pulpit side come forward in the center aisle first to receive the bread. Then turn to pick up an empty cup for wine or a prepackaged cup of grape juice. An assisting minister will pour wine from the pouring chalice into the empty cup. Return used cups to a tray near the head of the side aisle as you return to your seat.
